## 1993-2002

*Emphasis on family treatment*  
*Expansion of prevention services*  
*Growth of community-based programs*  
*New fundraising tools*

## 1967-1992

*New cottages, Cowell Center and Curtis Park School open*  
*More group homes open*  
*Recreation therapy begins*  
*La Casita and Casa Restaurant open*  
*Focus includes prevention programs*

## 1943-1966

*“Orphan” stricken from name*  
*Focus on emotionally disturbed children*  
*Emphasis on community activities*  
*First group home opened*

## 1925-1942

*Administration building and Marzen Cottage built*  
*First social worker hired*  
*Stork’s Nest closed*  
*Sutterville Day Nursery opens*

## 1914-1924

*Becomes “Sacramento Orphanage and Children’s Home”*  
*Stork’s Nest opens*  
*Education replaces farming*  
*Foster care introduced*

## 1906-1913

*“Charles Place” on Sutterville Road purchased*  
*Home becomes “Sacramento Orphanage and Farm Association”*  
*Children move to seven cottages on the farm*

## 1867-1905

*The “Sacramento Protestant Orphan Asylum” opens*  
*Structure for 58 children built on L Street from private donation*  
*By 1888, 144 children from 1-14 years old lived in the building*
